BRAINSTORMING ONE OF THE VERY BEST

PROBLEM-SOLVING

TECHNIQUES

Suggestion: read through this entire sheet with your group before you brainstorming session begins.

Lots of people feel this exercise is just producing a bunch of off-the-wall-ideas that everybody can argue about. They misunderstand that the volume of ideas is spawned by <u>not</u> arguing about each one as it comes up.

There will be time later to debate strengths and weaknesses, but not yet.

This is similar to the shopping for a car and visiting five dealers who each show you ten cars. By looking at 50 vehicles you learn which features you do want or don't want.

If the only car you look at is your uncle's because "the price is right," chances are you may be disappointed three months later when you find out what that same money could have bought you.

Strengths

Having many ideas sheds far more light. "To have a good ideas, have lots of them." Edison Bad ideas spawn better ideas—spawn even better ideas—often spawning a great idea.

2. Weaknesses

Stopping at 5 or 10 possible solutions is easy, but almost always less productive. Your best ideas may <u>OFTEN</u> come after 25 or 30 suggestions have been put forth.

Selecting "committee" members who are impatient. Creative people are often very patient.

Stopping too soon when you think you have reached a feasible solution.

Passing judgment in early stage is foolish.

3. Tips

Write <u>every</u> idea on the board or huge pad of paper for everyone to see.

Explain the "rules" below—tell them that the GOAL is to find the best solutions.

THE GOAL: we want to think of 5 effective solutions [not just 1 great one] to such-and-such a problem [difficult situation, snafu, complication, divisive issue, maybe even a personality conflict, etc.]

In Round One criticism is forbidden until we have at least 25 fresh ideas on the board.

Wild ideas [even expensive or irrational] ones go on the list.

Hitch-hike on the last suggestion: adapt, modify, magnify, substitute, rearrange, reverse.

NO ONE EVER SAYS ANYTHING NEGATIVE ABOUT ANYONE'S IDEAS until after an hour of thinking, and then everyone is expected to think negatively about every suggestion.

When you strongly disagree with an idea set forth, say, "Oo-oo, that made me think about blahblah-blah!" There will be time later to explain blatant weaknesses, or disastrous results. Distracting dissenters and negative parties must be kindly asked to dismiss themselves. Learn to pick out people, creative thinkers, outside-the-box people.

If a member realizes that he/she can't stand this kind of thinking, let him remove himself.

4. Examples of problems to be solved

Reaching every child in 2-mile radius with invitations to VBS 6 different times.

Starting a Spanish radio broadcast or Spanish-interpreter ministry in morning worship.

Paying for building improvements.

Recruiting & training new Sunday School teachers.

Stopping the exit of families who go to ______ Church.

Getting more kids out to youth meetings.

Raising scholarship money for camp [or trip to Haiti, feed the poor neighbors, paving the parking lot, etc.]

On the next page are the results a session I led starting with experienced, creative people and a blank sheet of paper. Many suggestions were cost or time prohibitive. Most were never employed. Many were tried in outreach programs throughout nearby communities and thousands of kids were touched. This took more than one hour-long session. Population of town = 125,000.
