6 More TIPS

- 1. <u>Ask</u> searching questions to hear why they have some serious objections to the Gospel. Don't argue [yet] about the weaknesses of their belief system.
- 2. Explain that not all sources are reliable. Dishonesty is not a crime, but don't believe everything.
- 3. **Remind** them that a good excuse is still just an excuse.
- 4. <u>Suggest</u> that their objection might sound ludicrous if applied to some other things.
- 5. Encourage them to find the areas where they can agree with the Bible and do some heavy lifting to evaluate the specific annoying areas of Christian beliefs. Many people have trusted in Christ as Savior, while still skeptical.
- 6. <u>Ask</u> them what it would take to depend upon Jesus Christ as the One who paid for their sin.
